Interviewer If you weren't able to get to the Glastonbury Music Festival this year, you're in luck, as the Cornbury Music Festival's coming up very soon. And joining me now to tell us a bit more about it is Lucy Hanworth. Lucy's what we call a seasoned festival goer – she goes to several festivals every year! Welcome Lucy and thanks for stopping by today.

Lucy Hi!

Interviewer Now, tell us, how long does the Cornbury Festival last for?

Lucy Well, it takes place every year in July, and mostly, but not always, on the first weekend of the month. It's spread over three days. Tickets sell out really quickly, but cancelled tickets are available about four days before the festival starts.

Interviewer And where is it held?

Lucy Well, it all happens in a huge field not too far from the towns of Charlbury and Banbury. There's been talk of moving it to a new location, like a park or something, but I hope that doesn't happen. There are other festivals in city parks. This one really has the feel of a village fair because there's so much going on – it's not just music. You can buy things like jam, for example, and there's stuff for the whole family to do as well.

Interviewer You mentioned that there's something for everyone at the festival. Like what, for instance?

Lucy Well, for kids, for example, there are loads of workshops where they can learn something new. Last year, I remember they had an Indian dance thing run by a local teacher where kids could learn Bollywood dancing, just like in the films! It was brilliant! Interviewer That all sounds great! So, what about the camping facilities?

Lucy They're pretty good; there's a big choice actually. You've got things like podpads ...

Interviewer ... podpads? What exactly are they?

Lucy They're basically like a little wooden hut with a door that you can lock, so all your stuff'll be safe. The beds are raised off the ground, so even if it rains you'll be nice and dry, which is the best thing about them as far as I'm concerned. They're soundproof too, so you won't get woken up by the music. Oh, and they've got lights and sockets for you to charge your mobile and so on. They're good if you want some private time.

Interviewer They sound like just the thing for a festival in this country! What about the music? What's on offer at Cornbury?

Lucy There's a really good range and that's because it's a festival for all ages. Usually, there are lots of pop artists and some really famous names. There's plenty of rock too and a few years ago, they introduced some jazz artists. They were a hit with the crowd, so I think that's going to continue.
